News and Information



Midway Point

The 87th Session has passed the midway point and hearings are slowly turning into marathons, lasting well into the morning hours. Our most recent hearings in State Affairs coincided with hearings in Homeland Security & Public Safety with both covering a number of high profile issues. Hundreds of people poured into the Capitol, many waiting until the wee hours of the morning to express their passionate positions on a range of issues.

<u>Constitutional Carry</u> - Several bills were presented with slightly different approaches to permitless carrying of a handgun. The more open view is the constitutional approach that would allow handgun carrying by anyone unless

prohibited from ownership, without required training or a license. Other variations include at least meeting the requirements of a license to carry without the actual need for a license, although allowing the license to remain in place for reasons of reciprocity with other states. We received a large number of calls, emails, and petitions in support of this issue as well as opposition to it. There are more bills yet to come in this category and we are watching to see what if any changes are submitted on each. **Status - Pending in Committee**

Publicly Funded Lobbying - This bills seeks to prohibit the funding of lobbying efforts by units of local government. That would mean that cities, counties, school districts, port authorities, or any other taxing entity could not pay for outside lobbyists with public funds. The bill does not restrict such entities from having full time staff perform these functions. We heard from scores of people and elected officials with positions on both sides of the issue. Large entities can probably afford and may already have employees to staff such positions, where smaller rural areas rely on their representations at the Capitol to come from lobbyists or staff from their related associations such as the Texas Association of Counties, the County Judges & Commissioner's Association, or the Texas Municipal League. Status - Pending in Committee

George Floyd Act - The George Floyd Act is a comprehensive overhaul package of police reform issues. From prohibiting Class "C" arrests, restricting certain "holds" or "techniques", as well as creating direct liability for peace officers, this sweeping bill had a large number of people come to testify in support of the bill. Law enforcement associations came to accept responsibility for their part of some of the issues seen recent years but took exception to drastic changes in qualified immunity or complete prohibition on Class "C" arrests, stating some circumstances do not fit well with "Cite & release" policies. Releasing a drunk, peeping Tom, or other situations are not always resolved with just a ticket. Status - Left Pending In Committee

Public Camping Ban - This bill puts pressure on larger urban and metropolitan areas to find solutions for the public camping problems that have led to hundreds camping on streets, under bridges, and panhandling on streets and intersections. This issue likewise has enthusiastic support and opposition. While some say it is inhumane to punish those who are already homeless and cannot afford a ticket or warrant, others say the measures currently being taken encourage further homelessness by providing free services, facilities, and food. Austin's Town Lake area along Caesar Chavez, and under I-35 have become a mecca for the homeless in a sea of tents, much like what Houston saw under the overpass of I-45 near the George R. Brown Convention Center. Status - Left Pending In Committee

Texas Electrical Grid & ERCOT

Most of our research into the failings of ERCOT during the big freeze in February has concluded, with nearly 40 hours of hearings crammed into 3 days. Bills attempting to address issues that contributed to the electrical system failure, volatility in pricing in the electricity market, and reliability of our grid in the future are beginning to come to the House floor for discussion. At the same time, the Senate has sent over SB 3 which is a comprehensive bill addressing many of these issues and is awaiting assignment to a committee for hearings.

I have co-authored six of the bills that address preparedness, a statewide extreme weather alert system, creation of a Texas energy Disaster Reliability Council, and restricting regulations for the wholesale indexed products by retail electric providers. These six bills were voted out of the House and will now be sent over to the Senate. There will be other bills and it will take some time before we know the final form of the reforms dealing with the future reliability of our electrical grid.





Texas House Plan for electricity reform

House Bill 10: Reforming ERCOT

Requires all ERCOT board members to reside in Texas and creates an additional board position to represent consumer interests.

House Bill 12: Alerting Texans

Creates an alert system to alert Texans of impending disasters and extreme weather and provide information on power and utility outages to affected consumers.

House Bill 16: Defending Ratepayers

Protects consumers from sky-high electric bills by banning the sale of wholesale indexed products to residential customers, which can leave them vulnerable to extreme fluctuations in electricity prices.

House Bill 11: Weatherizing Facilities

Requires electric transmission and generation facilities to be weatherized, and gives them the discretion to choose the best weatherization methods for them.

House Bill 13: Improving Coordination

Establishes the Texas Energy Disaster Reliability Council to improve coordination between the electricity and natural gas industries, which are crucial to providing electricity to Texans.

House Bill 17: Empowering Consumers

Ensures homeowners, builders, and businesses have the ability to decide how best to meet their energy needs and prohibits policies that would ban or discriminate against a single energy source in new construction:

Our Legislation This Session

Legislation for this session has begun to hear bills in committees and we are starting to see some movement.

<u>House Bill 759</u> - Relates to the creation of an electronic process to track school threat assessments created in the last session of the Texas Legislature. The student threat assessment database would take the by-product of the

threat assessment teams and allow it to follow the students permanent school record electronically. **Status - Left Pending In Committee**

House Bill 766 - This is the same bill I filed and pursued last session. It creates a database that would contain any conditions of bond imposed on a defendant for violent offenses, like family violence. It is designed to protect the victims of family violence and responding police officers in the time between the initial arrest until a protective order is issued by a court. I worked with Senator Kolkhorst last session to pass a similar bill that was ultimately vetoed by the Governor due to a bad amendment that tainted the bill. Her version in SB 343 this session is coming to the House and I will be co-sponsoring it. Status - Voted out of Committee unanimously sent to calendars.

House Bill 1049 - This bill clarifies the peace officer authority of deputy sheriffs and constables in the time after the expiration of the term of the Sheriff or Constable at midnight December 31st, until the deputy can be issued a new oath of office for a new term of office or under new office holder.

Status - Voted out of Committee.

House Bill 1417 - Relates to the development of a campus improvement plan that includes, violence and bullying prevention and intervention on campus for dropout deterrence, including providing a research-based teacher development program that provides teachers continuing education that includes creating a nurturing classroom environment; developing respectful and caring relationships with students; promoting student emotional health, and more. Status - Awaiting a hearing in Public Education

House Bill 1681 - Relates to restrictions for issuance of permits for construction of any new assisted living facility within a 500 year floodplain. Many of our constituents complained when an assisted living center was built immediately adjacent to Cypress Creek after the Harvey Flood exposing many of our vulnerable seniors to hazards that could impair a rescue in an area known to flood. Status - Awaiting a hearing in Human Services

House Bill 1684 - This is an omnibus crime bill to enhance the penalties for offenses committed during mass riot events. While peaceful protests are an American right, damage to property and injury are not. Last year rioters in Austin did \$60 thousand dollars in damage to our State Capitol and vehicles.

Status - Awaiting a hearing in Criminal Jurisprudence

House Bill 2610 - Relates to the time for completion of a fire code inspection following submission of an application request. This bill extends the timeline to 10 business days. **Status - Voted out of Committee unanimously.**

House Bill 3256 - This bill addresses the confidentiality of a public school employee's home or residence address in certain government records and documents to protect their home and families from potential retaliation from school related actions or decisions. It permits them the option to "opt out" of public access to tax records, vehicle registration, or driver's license data.

Status - Awaiting a Hearing in Public Education

House Bill 3363 - The bill addresses issues currently being experienced by law enforcement and prosecutors in dealing with social media companies such as Facebook responding to search warrants issued under Texas law.

Status - Awaiting a Hearing in Criminal Jurisprudence

House Resolution 23 - Relates to congratulating the Champions Golf Club on their hosting the 75th Annual US Women's Open the 10th through the 14th of December





COVID Cases Reported In Harris County




The chart above provides a reflection of the trend for COVID-19 cases reported for all of Harris County during the last 14 days.




The second chart displays the hospital population trend of COVID cases. It should be noted there will be occasional time lags or delays in reporting that can affect total numbers.



COVID VIRUS & VACCINES IN TEXAS

Texas COVID cases in Texas now number at 2,388,650 confirmed cases and the death toll stands just over 47,000. Pfizer and Moderna vaccines continue to roll out to hospitals, pharmacies, and clinics across the state. Johnson & Johnson has recently received approval for distribution from the Centers for Disease Control for its "one-shot" dose vaccine. It is the third in the United States to obtain approval but the only single dose vaccine to date. The vaccines continue to be distributed to hubs and providers and all adults over the age of 16 are now available to receive the vaccine. Texas has now surpassed 10 million doses administered, with 3.5 million individuals being receiving their 2nd dose.

Governor Abbott on March 2nd issued an executive order lifting the mask mandate and business capacity requirements for counties with a COVID hospitalization rate of less than .15% over a 7 day period. The virus is still a threat to our society and the Governor, as well as local leaders, encourage the citizens of Texas not to abandon safe practices that have been successful this past year.

While these are just statistics, remember these cases and fatalities are friends, neighbors, and loved ones.

THREAT LEVEL SYSTEM

Harris County's Threat Level System, which can be found here: <u>READY HARRIS THREAT LEVEL</u>, provides the current threat status to the County. Executive Orders and other COVID related news for Harris County as well as the COVID Dashboard can always be found at <u>www.readyharris.org</u>.

Harris County now has met only one of the metrics for change in status in the current downward trend in COVID hospital population and the reduction in daily new positive cases. There are four more metrics to meet before a change in threat status will be downgraded. (Note that the county uses a 14 day average as opposed to the 7 day average used by the state)

As your State Representative, I continue to maintain contact with our county and state officials and provide you details and updates from those calls. I try to keep you posted on updates to news and announcements about local actions and state efforts to contain this virus and to provide the highlights so you aren't inundated and hope you find our information useful. Like many of you I am concerned about the growing restrictions on our lives and businesses and I hope it yields a continued improvement in the spread of the virus in the coming months.
