Early Tuesday morning, 12:45 AM, the legislature adjourned for the fourth time this year to close out the 3rd Special Session of the 87th Legislature. We were able to accomplish so much during those 30 days, and the policy decisions that were made will have a lasting impact on the state.

The most important topic addressed this session was Redistricting. This was an incredibly difficult process. The population dynamic has changed significantly over the last ten years. As a result of a steady population increase, urban counties maintained their representation while rural representation saw a decline, with many representatives from those areas picking up more counties; however, the suburban counties saw the most dynamic change in this cycle. The maps that were passed will go into effect in January of 2023. It

is a tremendous honor serving as the State Representative for Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Hood, and Shackelford Counties. My office is still open to all constituents of House District 60 until January of 2023, and I will continue to be responsive and fight for your needs. Even though the district has changed, the relationships my staff and I have forged this session will always remain.




construction projects across the district. After serving on the House
