Happy St. Patrick's Day! It was a very busy week at the Capitol so let's get right to it.

This week I laid out 11 of my bills in committee. These bills ranged from smart Criminal Justice reforms to strengthening our Judiciary. Here's a quick look at each bill that I laid out - click on the link to learn more about each one:

- HB 1736 Relating to the extent of a defendant's criminal responsibility for the conduct of a coconspirator in a capital murder case and the review of certain convictions by the Board of Pardons and Paroles.
- HB 1737 Relating to automatic orders of nondisclosure of criminal history record information for certain misdemeanor defendants following successful completion of a period of deferred adjudication community supervision.
- <u>HB 1741</u> Relating to creating a criminal offense for the unauthorized disclosure of non-public judicial opinions and judicial work product.
- <u>HB 1748</u> Relating to the use of a facsimile signature on certain public securities and related certificates.
- <u>HB 1763</u> Relating to the disposition of money from certain attorney accounts delivered to the comptroller as unclaimed property.
- HB 2014 Relating to reimbursement for jury service.
- HB 2015 Relating to the exemption from jury service for persons over a certain age.
- HB 2022 Relating to residential construction liability.
- <u>HB 2024</u> Relating to statutes of limitation and repose for certain claims arising out of residential construction.
- <u>HB 1743</u> Relating to allowing certain inmates to apply for supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits to be provided at the time of discharge or release.
- <u>HB 1747</u> Relating to allowing certain inmates to apply for supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits to be provided at the time of discharge or release.





TEXAS HOUSE PRIORITY BILLS


Last week I started introducing some of the House priority bills beginning with <u>House Bill 2</u> which will provide substantial property tax relief to all Texas property owners. This week I'm going to talk about Border Security and important Public Education bills.

Where the Federal government has over and over again failed to protect our southern border, Texas is stepping up to secure it. House Bill 7 will create a Legislative Border Safety Oversight Committee whose sole purpose would be to guide the state's border safety policies. With an unsecure border we've seen firsthand the plague that human trafficking and drug smuggling has had on our communities. House Bill 800 increases the mandatory minimum sentence for human trafficking to 10 years in prison, while also requiring a person who is convicted of running a stash house to serve a minimum of 5 years.

It's vital that we not only continue to invest in our public schools and our hardworking educators but that we also make sure they are safe while doing it. House Bill 3 will improve school safety standards – including having at least one armed security officer on every school campus - and make sure they are properly enforced. House Bill 13 will provide more funding opportunities to school districts for school safety, accessibility to mental health programs, and requires schools develop Active Shooter Preparedness Plans. With inflation at alarming rates, many of our retired teachers are struggling to make ends meet. House Bill 600 will deliver a cost-of-living adjustment for Texas retired teachers while maintaining the actuarial soundness of the Teacher Retirement System pension fund. The bill does so by providing eligible retired educators with a one-time, upfront cost-of-living increase beginning in 2024 based on the years of retirement, with a \$5,000 cash payment for the state's oldest retirees.

With House Committees in full swing, I wanted to provide you with a step-by-step guide on how to testify in front of a committee. Personal testimony is pertinent for committee members as well as bill authors so they can hear firsthand how a bill might impact one's family, business or community. And as always, my Capitol staff stands ready to help you with anything you need!
